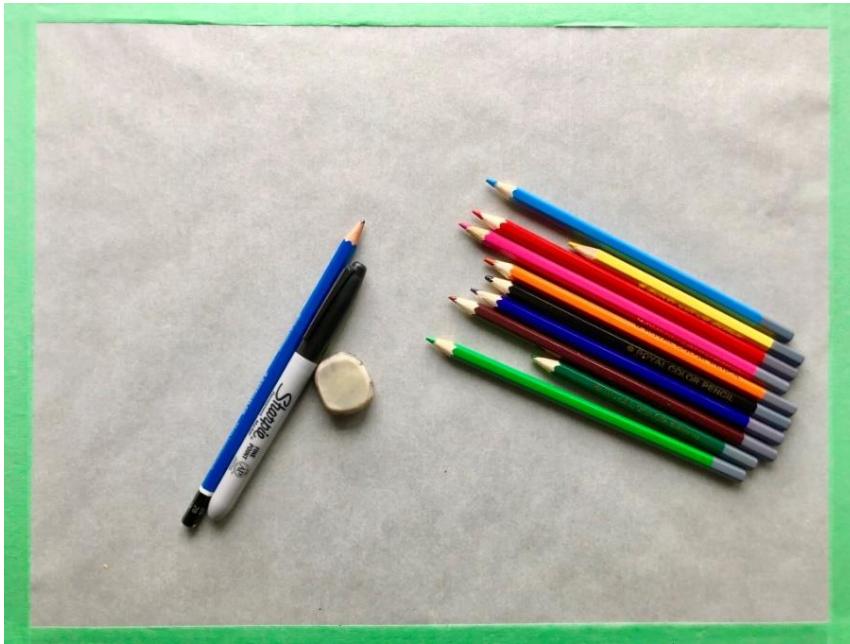


EVERYTHING IS CONNECTED

STEP 1: COLLECT AND ORGANIZE ALL OF YOUR MATERIALS

Gather the following materials:



- Pencil
- Markers, including black
- Parchment paper, cut to your desired size and shape
- Painter's or masking tape
- Coloured pencils
- Eraser

** Feel free to be creative with the size and shape of your paper. This final artwork will be placed on the window, so the more creative, the better!*

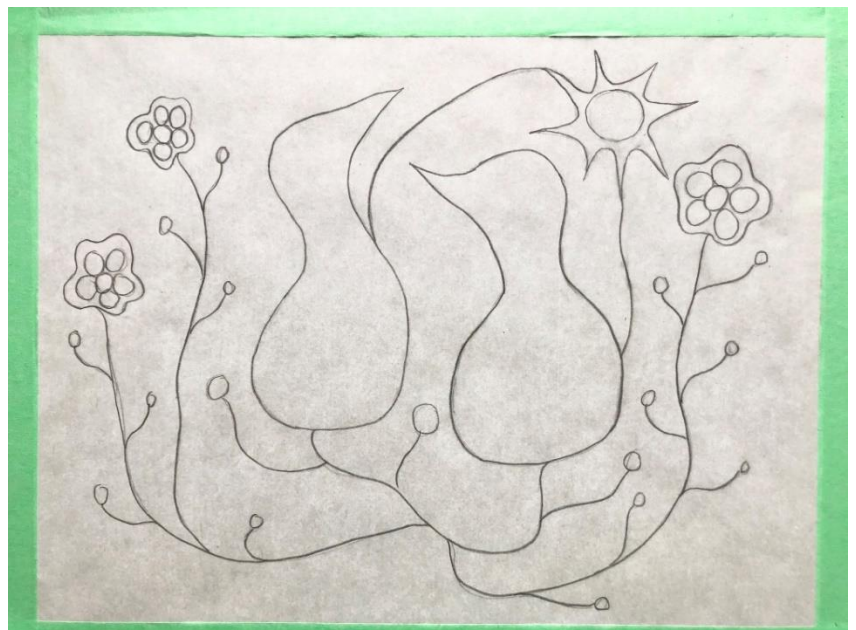
TIP: Be sure to tape your paper down so that it doesn't move while you work.

STEP 2: SKETCH OUT YOUR COMPOSITION IN PENCIL

Consider what you would like to draw. Using the work of artist Norval Morriseau as inspiration, we will create today's project in the Woodland School style. Try and imagine viewing the world through Morriseau's eyes.

Begin by lightly sketching your composition with a pencil.

- Remember to connect all of your images together with a line
- Everything will be outlined with black so keep this in mind when you are drawing

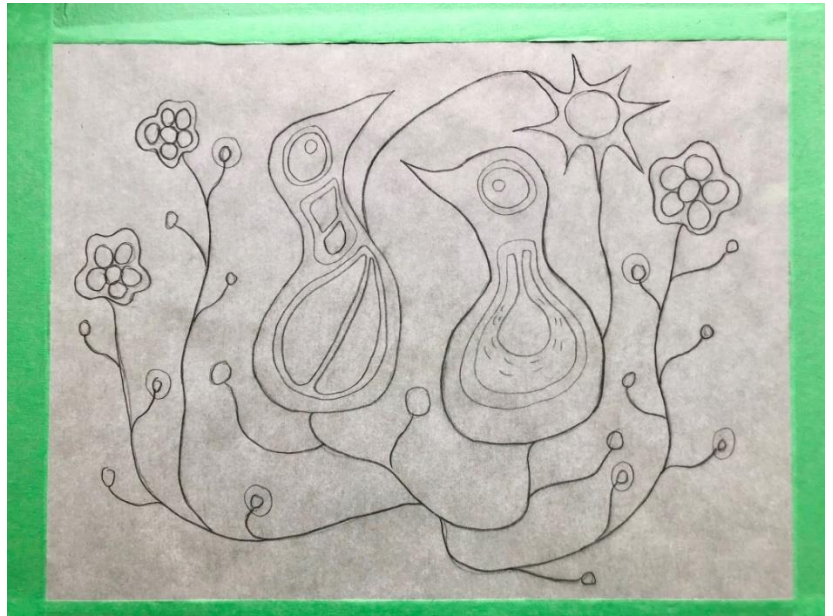


STEP 3: FILL YOUR IMAGES WITH MORE SHAPES OR OBJECTS

Begin to fill all of your images with organized shapes. These could be purely decorative, or they could represent something in your life. You can even consider using recognizable images from the world around us such as:

- A heart inside an animal or eggs inside a fish!
- Different organic shapes or dots that represent the number of people in your family

TIP: When drawing your shapes, keep in mind that you will be adding different colours later on and that each shape will be a new colour.

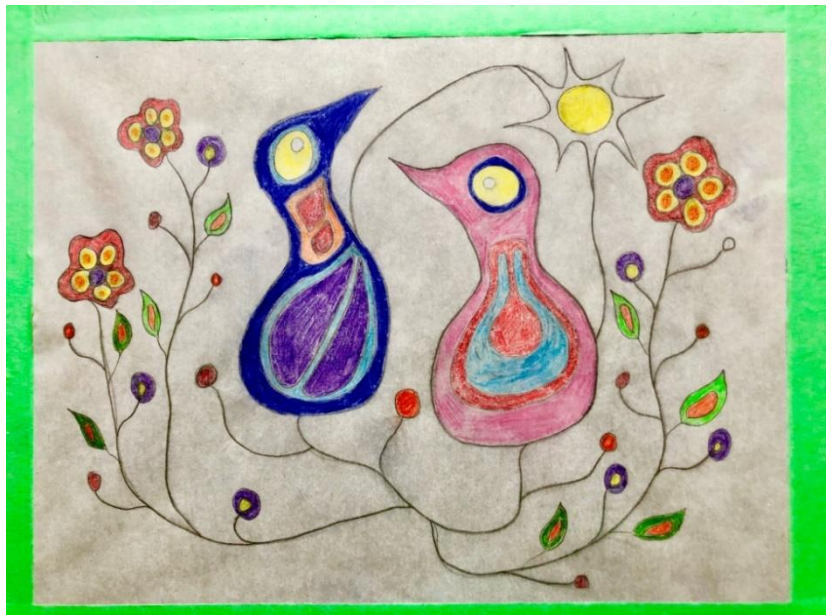


STEP 4: ADD COLOUR

Once you are happy with your picture you can begin to colour everything in.

- Try to use colours that work well together. For example:
 - Complementary colours: purple and yellow; green and red; orange and blue.
 - Put warm and cool colours together.

TIP: If you begin with a cool colour, think about putting a warm colour next to it, then go back to cool—alternating colours in this way creates a nice balance and adds contrast to your picture.



STEP 5: ADD BLACK LINES

Once everything is coloured-in, trace over every line with your black marker. You may need to do this twice, so take your time with this step and trace carefully.

Remember to vary the size of your black line to make it more interesting, and don't forget to connect everything together.



STEP 6: FINAL TOUCHES

If you are not happy with the colours, you can now go over the pencil crayon with your coloured markers to make them a bit brighter.

When your drawing is complete, carefully peel off the tape holding it down, and use some new tape to stick it on a window to give it a different look. People from outside can see what you have created!

CHALLENGE YOURSELF:

Make a frame for your new piece of art—try using tin foil or cardboard with glitter!
